Dear Friend of the Zygon Center,

This spring the Zygon Center for Religion and Science celebrates several projects designed to nurture the next generation of religion and science leaders. In February, we hosted our sixth student symposium. Papers engaged questions about topics including technology, neuroscience, *imago dei* and dementia, virgin birth, the significance of place, and religious naturalism. We explored connections for public theology, pastoral care, and scientific advances. The interdisciplinary research was an encouraging window into the creativity of student scholars from around the world.

The Zygon Center is nurturing the next generation of church leaders, as well. With the support of a curriculum grant from the John Templeton Foundation, we have created nearly 20 learning modules in religion and science, including six modules for more than half of the required courses of the Masters of Divinity degree. In so doing, the next generation of church leaders are being provided with tools for thinking theologically about science and technology, leadership skills for recognizing and nurturing scientific vocations, and experiences with integrating religion and science for better pastoral care. The project was featured in a recent issue of *The Christian Century* on theological education (February 18, 2015).

These projects continue the Zygon Center's long tradition of nurturing the next generation of religion and science leaders through courses and public lecture series, like the Epic of Creation and the Advanced Seminar in Religion and Science. This year's highlights include many outstanding lectures and a visit to Argonne National Laboratory. The Zygon Center builds up the capacities of next generation scholars and church leaders to engage in the "yoking" of science and religion for the sake of the world.
